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Frog's Rainy-Day Story Teaching Ideas for Children

We're made for a much larger story, which we miss when we seek our own glory.

What do you like to do on a rainy day? Draw a picture and share it with someone.

Why were the letters upset at the beginning of the fable? What did they do to try to solve their problem? What did they discover in the process?

Letter a wants all letters to be equal. How unfair is it that some letters are capitals and other letters are not? What would this sentence look like if all letters were exactly equal?

The letters in the fable wanted to be important. What do you think they were looking for? How important is it to feel important? How does it feel to know that you are important to God?

Even though we are all different, God loves us all the same (2 Chronicles 19:7). The Bible says, *"For this is how God loved the world: He gave his one and only Son, so that everyone who believes in him will not perish but have eternal life"* (John 3:16). What does this mean? How does it make you feel to know that God loves you this much?

Jesus told his followers that the greatest person is the one who serves, and that whoever tries to make himself great will be humbled (Matthew 23:11-12). In your own words, explain what Jesus is saying. How did Jesus serve others?

God made each of us different and special in wonderful ways. Make a list of some of the special gifts God has given to you. How can you use them to serve others?

Another kind of rainy-day story is recorded in Genesis 6-9. This is the story of Noah and his family, who spent forty rainy days and nights on an ark. Why did God cause it to rain? What do you think life would have been like on the ark? If you had been a passenger on the ark, what would you have most wanted to do? Draw a picture and share it with someone.

Frog wrote a story. What kind of stories do you like best? Make up a story and tell it to someone. Who could help you act out your story? What kind of props will you need? Who will want to watch you perform your story?

HELP FROG VISIT GRASSHOPPER

Frog wants to row his boat across the pond to visit Grasshopper. If he leaves Duck, Fox, and the grain behind, Duck will eat the grain, and Fox will chase away Duck. What one thing can Frog take with him to avoid these problems?

(The boat is too small to take more than one thing.)

If there's only one way, It's foolish to say Another way is okay.

Beaver told Duck how to get to the pond, but Duck didn't listen. Why do you think Duck chose to go his own way? What did Duck want more than a swim?

How much do you like to have your own way? Think of something you have done recently because you wanted to obey God, even though you would have liked to have done something else. How did that turn out? What did changing the sign do to the pond? What did it do for Duck?

What do you think happened to Duck? Can you think of a time when you didn't listen to good advice? What happened?

Think of some of the tasks that various people you know do, such as delivering the mail, teaching school, and cooking meals. What do you think would happen if everyone did these tasks the easiest way instead of the right way?


Think of something you did your best on recently. Perhaps it was a homework assignment, a household chore, or some other task. How did you feel when you finished? How do you think you would you have felt if you had taken an easy shortcut and not done your best?

The Bible says, *"Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path"* (Psalm 119:105). How can God's Word in the Bible help you choose the right path for your life?

Proverbs 21:2 says, "People may be right in their own eyes, but the LORD examines their heart." And Proverbs 16:25 says, "There is a path before each person that seems right, but it ends in death." In your own words, what are these proverbs saying? How do they apply to this fable? How do they apply to your life?

Some people say that there are many paths to God (see page 15 of *Frog's Rainy-Day Story and Other Fables* for two examples), but the Bible says that the only way to God is by trusting in Jesus as God's only Son (John 14:6, Acts 4:12). Does it really matter which path we take? Why?

Help Duck get to the pond without tripping over Turtle, getting pecked by Gander, or getting frightened by Fox.




DUCK'S WORD SEARCH

Rules are sometimes hard to obey, But they help keep us from going astray.

Unfortunately, the play never happened. What went wrong? What should the animals have done differently?

Cow, Goat, and Hen clearly dislike rules. What do you think your life would be like if there were no rules you had to obey at your school, in your home, or anywhere else? What if parents, teachers, and other adults did not have any rules to obey? For example, what if people were allowed to drive cars whatever way they wanted? What if they were allowed to take things that belong to others?


Psalm 19:9-10 says, "The laws of the LORD are true; each one is fair. They are more desirable than gold, even the finest gold. They are sweeter than honey, even honey dripping from the comb." Why is it important to know and obey the instructions God has given to us in the Bible?

In our culture, being tolerant is generally thought of as a good trait. In simple terms, to be tolerant is to allow others to think or do as they wish, even when we don't agree. Cow, Hen, and Goat pride themselves on being tolerant. They feel Cow should wear whatever she wants, for example. But how tolerant are they toward Pig and the script? How good is it to allow people to do whatever they want?

When creating art, it's sometimes fun to break rules. In the space below, draw a picture with lots of things that are different from the way they really are. Ask some family members and friends to see how many crazy things they can spot.

Why do you think Turtle boasts so much? What does this tell us about Turtle?

Turtle was created by God to be a turtle. Why do you think he wants to be something different?

In Psalm 34:1-3 below, King David of Israel, who lived about 1,000 years before Jesus, does some boasting. How is his boasting different from Turtle's boasting?


I will praise the LORD at all times. I will constantly speak his praises. I will boast only in the LORD; let all who are helpless take heart. Come, let us tell of the LORD's greatness; let us exalt his name together.

In the Bible, the Apostle Paul tells us, "Don't be selfish; don't try to impress others. Be humble, thinking of others as better than yourselves. Don't look out only for your own interests, but take an interest in others, too." (Philippians 2:3-4). What does this mean to you? How difficult is this to do?

Jesus said that he came not to be served but to serve others and to give his life as a ransom for many. (Mark 10:45) Draw a picture below showing one way in which Jesus served others.

Setting happiness as a goal doesn't bring happiness. Why?


The Bible says that our goal should be to know and love God and walk humbly with Him. Can we have both this and happiness as goals? Why or why not?

In the fable, Hedgehog warned Rabbit about Fox. Why do you think Rabbit ignored Hedgehog's advice?

To love others, we sometimes must do or say things that they may not consider nice. For example, we may need to tell them an unpleasant truth in a loving way because the truth is what will help them. Can you think of a time when a family member or friend loved you enough to tell you the truth, even though it was hard for you to hear? Can you think of a time when you helped someone else in this way?

How important is it for you to know that you can trust other people? How important is it for others to know they can trust you?

How important is it for you to know that you can trust the Bible? Talk with a parent, a grandparent, or a teacher at your church about why you can trust the Bible.



Miss Hen is very popular. How do you think she feels about all the attention? What does this tell you about Miss Hen?

How do you feel when you get lots of attention, for instance at a party to celebrate your birthday? What happens when you get too much attention?

Why do you think Miss Hen never married? What kind of rooster will meet her standards?


The Bible says that it is good to marry, and it is good not to marry (1 Corinthians 7:25-38). The most important thing when making any decision is to do God's will (Romans 12:2). We can know God's will by studying His Word in the Bible and by asking for His guidance in prayer. We can also get guidance by talking to others who love Jesus and seek to follow him. Talk to someone you trust about how you can form the habit of seeking and doing God's will.

In Luke 14:16-24, Jesus tells a story about a man who gave a great feast and invited many people. However, some who were invited made excuses about why they could not come. Why is it sometimes easier to make excuses than to simply tell the truth?

In Mathew 19:16-22, we read about a rich man who missed out on following Jesus because he was unwilling to give up his wealth. What are some other things besides money that people tend to care about more than God? How difficult is it to give up these things and put God first? Is there anything that you need to be more willing to give up? Ask God to help you.

In order to follow Jesus, we must up admit that we are sinners in need of a savior. Why is this difficult for many people? Talk with a parent, grandparent, or teacher at church about what this means and about how you can put your trust in Jesus as your Lord and Savior. Be sure to discuss the many blessings God gives to those come to Him.

All that amuses will soon be past; The wise invest in things that last.

> What is your favorite day of the week? What do you like to do on that day? Imagine a special day. Draw a picture of what you are doing on this day and show it to someone special.

In the fable, Gander jumped out of bed and exclaimed, *"This is my day! I get to do exactly what I want."* How much control did Gander have over his day?

King David of Israel wrote, "The earth is the LORD's, and everything in it. The world and all its people belong to him" (Psalm 24:1). Since the earth and everything in it belong to God, who would you say owns your days? How might this truth influence the way you live your life?

Gander got terribly upset when the king interfered with his plans for the day.

- How do you feel when your plans you are excited about get changed?
- What was more important to Gander than being the Royal Gander?
- How do you decide what to do each day? How much do you involve God in your decisions?
- What do you regularly spend time doing that may not be the best use of your time? What might you cut back on so you can have time for more important matters?

To really get to know God and understand His plan for your life, you must spend time with Him in prayer and reading His Word, the Bible. How can you do these two things better?

In John 10:27-28 Jesus says, "My sheep listen to my voice; I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they will never perish. No one can snatch them away from me." How does it feel to know that Jesus will care for you like a good shepherd cares for his sheep? Even if you make a mistake, he will forgive you and continue to love you.

The Apostle Paul says in Romans 10:9, "If you openly declare that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved." To know more about how to be saved by Jesus, talk and pray with a parent, grandparent, or someone at church who knows and loves God.
